NPS to Re-Open Potomac River Access at Fletcher's Cove

Thanks to quick responses by a coalition of local enthusiasts, the National Park Service said it would reopen Potomac River access at Fletcher's Cove. The NPS closed the facilities last October and declared the walkway to the boat dock unsafe for public use.

The National Capital Chapter TU issued the following statement:

Because of your passionate and timely action in showing such concern, officials with the National Park Service are aware of the problem and have assured the public that access to the river at Fletcher's will be restored by March, 2015. Kevin Brandt, Superintendent of the C&O Canal National Historical Park, and his staff earned our gratitude for their immediate response, fact gathering and sensitivity to the issues.

The National Park Service hosted a well-attended public meeting on December 17, and presented a series of aerial photographs from the 1950's onward to document the growing siltation problem in the cove. Attendees and Park Service personnel discussed alternative proposals for both short-term river access and long-term preservation of the cove. The Park Service made clear their commitment to fund and

implement a plan that addresses the immediate need for safe access to the Fletcher's dock.

The more complex long-term solution to the siltation at Fletcher's Cove will require your continued persistence and support. The Park Service anticipates a comprehensive study is needed and will develop a scope-of-work as a first step. This study would document the historical importance of access to river resources, verify the causes of increasing siltation and other environmental concerns, and suggest possible remediation. A detailed action and funding plan would be included. Our coalition must continue to assist with this vital effort to preserve the Fletcher's Cove experience for future generations to come.

This forum will be maintained as the process moves forward and the invitation to join our coalition remains active. Updates on progress will also be posted by participating organizations and emailed from potomacaccess@gmail.com. Please continue your active support to increase awareness by networking with other interested parties or organizations. A special thanks to KeepAmericaFishing.org, NCC-TU, TPFR and Urban Angler for spreading the word so our voice can be heard!

TRIP 1

Hughes River

VIRGINIA

When: January 3, 2015 Depart: 8 a.m. Return: Whenever Contact: George Paine

Meet: Dick's Fair Lakes parking lot

The first trip for 2012 is to the upper Hughes River. This is a fairly strenuous hike that will definitely warm you up on the way out.

This is a tough time of year to fish. Historically this trip gets cancelled due to inclement weather. That should be a hint to dress warmly and be prepared for bad weather to roll in. If foul weather is predicted for the day of the trip, you should call George Paine the night before to make sure the trip is still on. Also, check the Chapter's web site for announcements. Light rods and lines are best on most Shenandoah streams.

If you prefer to fish with dry flies,

try #18 or smaller black winter stoneflies, Adams and midges. You will find midges in abundance hovering just above the water. Look along the edges of pools and eddies and you may see a swirling hovering mass. You

can also find them right along the edge of the stream just a few inches onto the bank. Other flies to try are a #16 golden stonefly, olive and natural hare's ear, and #14 greencased caddis patterns. A small Bucktail or Wooly Bugger may yield results in some of the deeper pools.

Remember that if you are within the Park boundary and catch a Brown Trout you are not allowed to return it to the water. You may creel any Brown Trout over 7 inches, all others should be discarded away from the stream. As controversial as this is, it is the law. Oddly enough, the state allows fishermen to harvest

Brook Trout on this stream. Most of us practice catch and release.

TRIP 2

Conewago Creek

PENNSYLVANIA

When: January 31, 2015 Depart: 8 a.m. Return: You decide

Meet: Vienna Fire House N. of

Parking Area

THIS IS A SELF-GUIDED TRIP

The last trip in January is to Conewago Creek, near Biglerville, PA, located just north of Gettysburg. It's not a very long walk from your car to the stream.

You can fish Conewago with hip boots, but breathable waders are always an option.

There is room on Conewago Creek to use a longer rod and since you will probably spend some of the day nymphing, a longer rod will definitely come in handy.

There are a lot of mayfly nymphs of the fast-water clinging variety to include Quill Gordon and Cahill nymphs. The nymphs you find won't be as large as a #12 or #14, but that's the size to start with.

There are quite a few sculpin in Conewago Creek, and soft-hackle flies and even Glo-bugs take fish.

When you fish Conewago, don't overlook the mud sills our chapter helped build.

The fish in Conewago are mostly of hatchery size and origin.


JOHN HADLEY'S GEAR UP GUIDE FOR WINTER FLY TYING

No meeting this month so we will cover what you need to bring to a meeting to join in the monthly fly tying demonstrations. Listed in the order of importance:

Vise: any type vise will do; see if you can borrow or try out various models and

types before you buy one. If you plan on tying big flies for bass and/or ocean fishing I recommend a rotary vise. You can make a cheap vice using an X-Acto knife and look up designs on the web.

Bobbin: to hold the thread. I like the ones with a ceramic or plastic insert in the tube as a nick on a metal tube will cut the thread. You only need one. **Thread:** 6/0 can be used for any of



the flies that are demonstrated although you may want to use 3/0 for hooks larger than #6 and 8/0 for hooks smaller than #14. Colors: you can get

by with black, white and tan for the demonstrations and then add other colors if you find you will

be tying a lot of a pattern that calls for a different color. You can also use markers to color white thread.

Threader: I use a dental floss threader. I have a box of them so ask for one at the meeting if you need

Scissors: one fine for trimming thread and materials close to the fly and one rough (larger) for cutting heavy hair, hackle, wire (cut near

the jaws), etc.

Bodkin: you can make one with a needle and a 1/4 inch to 1/2 inch wood dowel.

Bodkin cleaner: make one by cutting a piece of Scotch-Brite Scour Pad to size, roll up and put into a film case or pill bottle. You can also use steel wool.

Pliers: for crushing down the barb on the hook.

Hackle Pliers: you can use electrical test clips.

Half hitch tool: you can use a small straw.

Whip Finisher: unless you can do it by hand.

Optional tools and things you will want to have as time goes by:

Hackle gauge: I measure the hackle I give you at the demo but you will want one to tie at home. You can just bend the hackle around the hook and eyeball it against the hook gap until you buy or make one.

Hair Stacker: you can borrow one at the meetings until you decide if you want to buy or make one.

Dubbing Comb: you can make one with a piece of hooked Velcro glued to a popsicle stick or pencil. You can borrow mine at the demo.

Hair Comb: for removing under fur/hair before stacking hair. A pet tick comb works well. You can borrow mine at the demo.

Dubbing pick: for grabbing hold of dubbing from a container, but you can also use your pliers to grab some dubbing.

Dubbing wax and head cement for use at home, but I'll supply at the

Hope you enjoy relaxing by tying up some flies this winter in anticipation of using them this spring, summer and fall or on a nice, relatively warm and sunny winter day.

Odenkirk to Discuss Snakeheads at FDM

The non-native Northern snakehead fish (Channa argus) has been seen in the Potomac and Occoquan Rivers, Dyke Marsh, Huntley Meadows Park, Hunting Creek, Little Hunting Creek, Dogue Creek and other northern Virginia waterways.

At the next quarterly meeting of the Friends of Dyke Marsh, 2 PM on Feb. 22, John Odenkirk, fish biologist with the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries, will explore the world of the snakehead—its characteristics, impacts —and discuss the future health of the Potomac River fishery. John is a certified fishery scientist who got his bachelor's degree from Virginia Tech and a master's in fishery biology from Tennessee Technological University.
