The first trip will be determined by water conditions. This unusual summer has created opportunities and challenges. Usually water is low in September so we have gone for Smallmouth Bass.

The Shenandoah Park streams, which usually are low and warm in July were at better than usual levels this summer. If we get some good rains before the trip we'll go to a brook trout stream. Conversely, the "good rains" will muddy the big

smallmouth rivers so we'll avoid them.

TRIP 2

Patuxent River

PENNSYLVANIA

When: September 26, 2015 Return: You decide

SELF-GUIDED TRIP

The second trip this month is to the Patuxent River in Maryland. There are two special regulation areas on different branches of the Patuxent. I suspect you will be going to the catch and release water above Triadelphia reservoir. This stretch must be over ten miles long and it forms

the boundary between Montgomery and Howard counties. There are also a couple of miles of delayed harvest water on the Mid-

further east. You will be fishing in mostly wooded parkland.

dle Patuxent River

The stream is accordingly less steep than those in Shenandoah Park. The stream is stocked with rainbows and browns, and there are some naturally reproducing browns. You can expect to see a predominance of brown

Four- and five-weight rods will be the order of the day, with most anglers preferring them in the shorter lengths. Hip boots will suffice, but I recommend lightweight chest waders. Look for fallen trees and other obstacles or tangles with overhead cover. Don't neglect overhanging banks either. Terrestrials and midges will be the flies of choice on top. As an alternative, try drifting a large, dark, wet fly by their noses.

No mention of the Patuxent River would be complete without reference to a favorite local fly, the Patuxent Special. This fly is a cousin to a Wooly Bugger and with the oversized hackle and fox-squirrel tail it is a pretty good crayfish imitation. If you prefer flies with marabou, try a #10 or #8 Eddie Shenk's White Streamer. Don't hesitate to experiment. (a vintage Mike Daly article)

SEPTEMBER FLY OF THE MONTH: DEMONSTRATED BY JOHN HADLEY

Kreelex



In the continuing fly tying techniques and materials series John Hadley will be tying the Kreelex. William Heresniak of Easter Trophies Fly Fishing made a presentation at our May 2015 meeting and stated that this is the best fly for catching big trout.

He has the pictures to prove it! You can also use it to catch smallmouth bass, largemouth bass, shad and other species of fish. The fly is a Clouser style tie but uses synthetic materials.

Originator: Chuck Kraft

Techniques to be learned:

· How to use Kreinik flash materials

RECIPE

Hook: Streamer 2, 3X #2 to 8 Thread: Yellow 6/0 Eves: Brass Dumbbells Tail: Silver Kreinik **Body:** Silver Kreinik Wing: Gold Kreinik

Options: add lead weight to shaft, use other colors of Kreinik, use other materials such as Flashaboo

or Krystal Flash.

Fishing Tips: This is a great fly for dark and clouded water. If the water is deep add weight 6 to 12 inches ahead of the fly to get the fly down to the bottom fast. In moving water cast across, let sink and be drawn through the water by the current; then use short strips to retrieve the line for another cast but be ready for a strike and set at any time.

In still water use as a searching pattern or cast to a likely lie; let sink then use short rapid strips to retrieve the fly but let the fly sink again between each stripping in of the line.
